We were in an old ship with more than 30 missions to her credit on 25 April. The target was Metz. We had two new engines, but when we were hit by flak near Clermont we had to feather one, and another was windmilling. I man was killed by the burst of flak (Williams). The others got out. We heard later from the French that Chisholm and Sango were sold by the Frenchmen who picked them up to the Gestapo for 20,000 frs apiece. ..

I hit the ground O.K. and stowed my chute. There were 15 or 20 Frenchmen already there in the field, and we had been told not to contact large groups, so we ran away. Soon after Lt. Rice (E&E Report No. 8/81) came to a field where there was a man working one alone. He was a Belgian. He helped us to a house nearby where we found the pilot and co-pilot. We stayed there that (day) while (all) qid? woman contacted the local Resistance people.

Later we were separated into two groups. Lt. Rice and I went to stay at Haudivilliers with a young girl and her family. She was wonderful to us - got us tobacco and gave us money. There was

an 18 yr. old boy there, too, who had blown up a German radio station, and 12 trains.

After about a week we were moved to Paris, where the underground took care of us. On 27 May we were sent to the country near the camp at Cloyes. We stayed there in various farms untily the campl .!! opened.

At first there were only about 10 in the camp. More came until at the end there were over 150. A second camp for Americans was formed about 2 miles away. In general, discipline, food, and guards were all right. The Germans knew somebody was in the forest, but they had no time to chase us up.

I stayed through the whole time at the camp and liked it pretty well. I think the men who ran it deserve a lot of credit, 2900 miff only for holding the boys together under difficult conditions.

The dropping operations were not always well arranged. The last time they dropped supplies and arms too near the Germans and everything fell into their hands. There was no reason for this as there were plenty of other fields nearby. 15. Post in Crew.

We came down near Audouville and stayed there at first. At Haudivilliers we stayed with the Dumont family. The daughter was the leading spirit in the Resistance.

When we went to Paris it was with Philip and Paul and their organization. They sent us to Chateaudyn on May 27. We stayed at Busloup until the camp was ready. Lucien Belgrave and John the Belgian were already there. \$\mathbb{D}\text{Lt}\$. Berry (see F&E Report 8/59) arrived a week or so later. Two Frenchmen, M. Ducros and a boy named Rene also helped very much in taking care of us and setting up the camp.

I thought John the Belgian was the best man in the camp. Lucien was too superior to do much work, and as result the boys had to take care of things themselves. The American part of the camp was better run than the British. (The nationalities were not separated, actually, it was just that there were more Americans in the newer part of the camp.)

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

- 1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

- 1. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SEGRET.
- You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.
 - (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
 - You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
 - You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
 - d You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.

 e No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the

theater.
