On the outskirts of NEUFCHATEL as it was getting dark, I approached a farmer. I declared myself, he took me in, fed me, his wife treated my burnt wrist and they put me up in the house for the night. I offered these people money, who refused it.

The next day they gave me sandwiches and I passed through NEUFCHATEL, where the railway seemed to be working and proceeded A8 on to BUCHY (sheet 9E/3 396289); on the way I saw bomb damage which had recently been repaired at the crossing (381312)(A) ABMINUS TRIAW

More help.

In the evening just before entering BUCHY I asked for shelter at another farm, disclosing myself to the owners. Here again I was fed, my wrist was dressed and I was given a night's rest.

On the road I passed large trucks with motor cycle escort containing what I then took to be acrophones. I think later that these were lorries carrying flying bombs. All these trucks had an escort and moved in a Northerly direction.

Steal bike.

About 10 kls outside of ROUEN I found a bicycle by the roadside which I took. On descending the cobbled hill into ROUEN the solid rubber tyres came off and I left the bike in a side street and went on to the centre of the town, which had been heavily bombed. The place was full of German soldiers. I did not dare to cross the SEINE, the remaining bridges being guarded.

I left the town making for DUCLAIR (sheet 8E/6 0421) which I reached that evening. As I was entering the town I stopped at a farm and asked for help. Two boys were brought in who questioned me and asked me to identity myself. They appeared satisfied and from this point my journey was arranged.

Flash. Buried at BLANGY cemetery (sheet 8F/1 581985) Fighter Pilot crashed on 6 Jun 44. No identification carried. A/C No. L.M. 133. Suspected to be member of R.A.F. French stated 2 stripes worn on epaulette, therefore F/Lt. rank.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.
