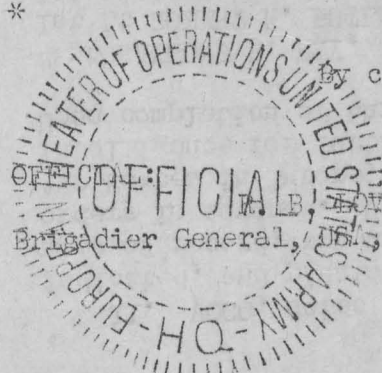

Ihle and Klinzing came down on 7 August 1944 near ~~ST MARTIN DE LA LIMUE~~ ST MARTIN DE LA LIMUE (4 kms S of LISIEUX, CALVADOS). Frenchmen were waiting for Ihle as he descended. They put him into civilian clothes as soon as he landed and hurried him about a quarter of a mile to the home of one of them, M. SYLVESTRE, ~~an~~ a grey-haired man of 60 years in whose house beside his wife there were two French refugees from labor camps, LUCIEN and ALBERT. Later in the afternoon Klinzing was brought here also.

Klinzing had been met by another farmer who had hidden him in a hedge, brought him food and clothing, and then taken him home whence after an hour or so another man came and led him to M. SYLVESTRE's house where he found Ihle. That afternoon they received a note from Sgt. Schaefer, their radio-operator, saying that he was slightly injured but was being well cared for in the neighborhood. Ihle and Klinzing slept in M. SYLVESTRE's barn that night, and in the morning they were led to another farmhouse ~~two miles away~~ two miles away where there lived a man 23 years old who was in the FFI, a girl of 20 who appeared to be his sister, and another family. Here they stayed a night. Then LUCIEN, from M. SYLVESTRE's place, and another man led them to COURTONNE, SE of GLOS; but when they found that the maquis to which they were going had been attacked by the ~~German~~ Germans they returned to this other man's house where the two Americans then lived for three days. This man and LUCIEN then led them to another maquis at GLOS, ^(3kms SE of LISIEUX) On the way ^(X) thither they met M. JEAN DESHAYES, chief of police of LISIEUX, who was living with his wife in a cave off the road west of VILLERS (a village 2 kms E of GLOS). It happened that the chief of the maquis, PIERRE, and his wife, a tall, dark, handsome woman, were visiting the cave just at this time. PIERRE's wife told Ihle that Sgt. Weting had been killed because his chute failed and that another member of his crew had been found dead in ~~the plane~~ the plane. BERNARD CHOLLET, who was living in GLOS but had worked in a garage in LISIEUX, arrived now and took the two Americans to a house on the main road from GLOS near the village of VILLERS inhabited by a widower about 65 years old, a relative of BERNARD CHOLLET's. Here they lived for five days, but then frightened by the increased activity of the Germans in the region the Americans asked to be allowed to go to the cave. This was granted and they stayed there with M. & MME JEAN DESHAYES

until the English troops came up on 24 August. When they arrived there were 50 refugees living in this cave; the number had increased to 100 when they left. On 24 August Ihle and Klinzing went out and met some British scout cars. They were taken back to H and then sent to CAEN. Thence they were taken to the 9th Air Force and from there proceeded by air to the U. K. on 27 August.

When they were at SYLVESTRE's house they were visited by Franck, Coone, and an English commando from ILFORD named Edwards. They were staying with MME. PICOT somewhere in the neighborhood. MME. PICOT was apparently in an organization, for Coone took the names and serial numbers of IE Ihle and Klinzing which MME PICOT said she was going to send by wireless to England.

Ihle and Klinzing saw in the CIMETIERE DE GLOS the grave of a P 47 pilot, CLARENCE PALMER, O 672666, who was shot down the end of July or the beginning of August. Sgt. Weting and the other member of his crew found dead in the plane were buried by the French in the cemetery of ST MARTIN DE LA LIEUE, CALVADOS.

SUBJECT: Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

The Commander-in-Chief, Southwest Pacific Area;

The Commanding Officers,
Base Commands;
Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.
2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supercedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

2. *a* You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.
 - (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.*b* You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
c You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
d You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.
e No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the theater.

GERTIFICATE

I have read the above and certify that I will comply with it.

I understand that any information concerning my *escape or evasion* from capture is **SECRET** and must not be disclosed to anyone other than the agency designated by A. C. of S., G-2, War Department, the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations, or to the Military Attache in a neutral country to whom I first report. I understand that disclosure to anyone else will make me liable to disciplinary action.

Did source see any other members of the crew dead or alive after reaching the ground?

YES, MY TAIL GUNNER

Did he receive any information from others as to whether any other members of the crew were dead or alive? If so, give details furnished by his informant and whether the other crew members were identified by name or otherwise. BESIDES MY TAIL GUNNER, I CONTACTED BOMBARDIER AND RADIO OPERATOR WHO WERE ALIVE, AND LEARNED FROM FRENCH THAT TWO MEN WERE DEAD. ONLY ONE NAME WAS GIVEN ME - SGT RALPH WETING, TOP TURRET, WHOSE PARACHUTE FAILED.

Did source examine the wreckage of the plane? If so, what was its condition?

YES. IT WAS COMPLETELY DEMOLISHED.

If the plane crashed in water how far was the plane from land and by what means was source rescued and what life rafts, wreckage, etc., remained on the surface that would have assisted other personnel to keep afloat.

What is source's opinion as to the fate of the other crew members and his reason for his opinion? THE FOUR OF US WHO WERE ALIVE ARE NOW BACK IN U.K. THE CO-PILOT AND TOP-TURRET GUNNER ARE BELIEVED TO BE BURIED IN THE CEMETERY AT ST. MARTIN DE LIEU, NEAR LISIEUX, FRANCE.

APPENDIX "B" TO E AND E REPORT NO.

List all military information which you observed or were told while evading. Give fullest possible details. (Airfields, troop encampments, coastal and interior defenses, AA batteries, radar installations, troop movements, results of allied bombing, location of enemy factories and ammunition dumps, enemy and civilian morale, etc., etc.,.....)

In the 17 days behind German lines I observed quite a lot of horse drawn wagons retreating through Glast (near Lisieux) from the trap at Falaise. They were moving at the rate of 50 per hour. The equipment was very poor, and the morale of the soldiers very low. Some had not eaten for four days, and had stolen calves to keep from starving. It was only possible for them to move at night, and in doing so there was a lot of confusion and many of them got lost. One group in particular passed me three times going in the same direction. The civilian morale was very high, and at least 75% were definitely pro-allies. Very few had any sympathy for the Germans. These people had lost their families and homes in the bombing and complete destruction of Lisieux. More than 2000 people were killed and all houses were demolished, yet it hadn't altered their feelings.
