- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and 2
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organiza-
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 883.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

- Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SEGRET. 2.
- You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D. (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
 - You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
 - You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4. No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the theater

The fourth day I was formed across the Seine by a fote Frenchman who introduced me to a freend at whose lower I stoped s days. I walked the next two days and was again sheltered each night I take the following day I met another Frenchman who coved for me until the arrival of American traffer.

On the 8 June, 1944, after being hit by flak, I baled out and landed in the woods at Hamelet (Jonne). Frenchmen picked me up, fed and clothed me, and showed me the road toward the Allied lines. I reached Omiecourt (Jonne) where I spent the night at the home of Res. man. The next day they sent me to Breteuil Sur Nove where I again found shelter at the for 1 nite home of a Res. man. The 3 hight I was sheltered at Gournay en Bray (S.INE). The 4th day I was ferried across the Seine by a Frenchman who took me to the home of a friend in Gaillon (EDRE) where I was given shelter for 1 night, and passing through Bernay (EDRE) to Orbec (CALMADO) where I was sheltered overnight. I then made my way through Falaise (CALMADO) to Moult (CALMADO) where I met a M. Robert Ruaux who worked for the French Secret Service. His Paris address is: 136, Ave. Emile Zola, Paris XV. I stayed with him in Moult for 6 weeks. Germans moved into the farm where we were staying so we cycled to Paris where I stayed at his flat for 1 week. He then sent me to M. Maurice Hillairaud, 129, Blvd. De Grenelle, Paris XV with whom I stayed until the arrival of American troops on the 24 Aug. M. Hillairaud was a member of the FFI.
