16 August 1943, we were attacked LE BOURGET by fighters near MERY SUR OISE. We were in the second element of the right squadron and wing. All the attacks hit us; our oxygen system was shot out, and the cockpit was on fire. I did not hear . ATTACKED BY a signal to bale out but when the navigator and I saw the engineer, co-pilot and pilot bale out we followed them.

> I jumped at 19000 feet and fell 5000 feet before pulling the / ripcord. There was one chute below me and three above. The aircraft crashed and burned before I got to the ground. I think I was the last man to bale out. There was no drift to my chute and when I saw I was going to land in a village I felt that capture was inevitable. By working with the shroud lines I avoided a roof and landed in a courtyard surrounded by houses.

GIVEN CIVILIAN CLOTHES IMMEDIATELY

About fifty French women and an equal number of barking dogs greeted me. They were all over me trying to help with the chute. Finally I managed to unbuckle it myself. Then I thought I was being attacked because they began tearing my clothes off me. I was undressed before I could stop them but I got the general idea when they shoved a civilian suit at me. It was a pair of old pants and a jacket. I kept my English boots which are like G.I. shoes and I persuaded the women to return my dog-tags, Aids Box and Purse. There were very few men in my crowd of helpers. One woman handed me a French-English dictionary: another gave me a musette bag of food, and, after looking in the dictionary to see what the 'Allez vite', which the women were screaming at me, meant, I ran out of the courtyard into a village street. All this had happened in less than ten minutes.

LEAVES VILLAGE WITHOUT FURTHER AID

I sauntered down the village street passing many Frenchmen who either chose to take no notice of me or didn't recognize me. On the outskirts I left the road for a path along the river bank. This path looked like a short cut to a hill which had been pointed out by one of the women in the courtyard as I started to leave.

WALKS INTO GERMANS SEARCHING FOR CREW MEMBER

After walking about half-a-mile along the side of the river, the path curved and without warning I ran into a large number of people in the middle of the path. I looked up, as they were doing, and saw a parachute in the top branches of a tree, fifty or sixty feet from the ground. There was no parachutist in sight and the discussion sounded to me as though they were planning how the chute could be retrieved. When it occurred to me that there were probably German soldiers about I examined the crowd more closely and saw about five. Like every one they were staring up at the chute. Then I happened to look into the wood and saw several Germans searching in pairs. I edged through the crowd and continued my walk down the path.

FOLLOWED BY FRENCHMAN

A mile further along the river I left the path for a road that would still lead me toward my objective - the hill. Then I noticed that a Frenchman as following me. He whistled at me when I looked back at him and I turn be bound to see what he wanted. I started to gesture but he motioned me to follow him quietly. We walked to a nearby building and I was left there alone while the man went to get another person. We used sign language and my dictionary to understand each other.

As we started handed me straw to chew on and we strolled nonchalantly through the German patrol. They were not close enough to see us but my friend pointed out two of them standing on the edge of the wood.

Leaving one wood we walked about a mile to another. An elderly man joined us for a few minutes butwent away to look for other members of the crew. My friend and I waited in the forest most of the afternoon. When the old man returned he told me he had found a blond comrade of mine. My friend and I followed the old man to the river where we picked up Lt BOYLE who was well disguised in swimming trunks and an odd looking swimming cap. From here our journey was arranged.



## APPENDIX "B" TO E & E REPORT NOS. 138 & 139

- 1. The following information has been obtained after an interview with an Officer and a Sergeant who evaded capture by the enemy after being in enemy-occupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of this information may be made, but when doing so, no information as to the source may be divulged.

Statement of information covering period from 16 August 1943 to 26 October 1943

- a. A target (troop-carrying Camions or half-track trucks) near the Pershing Hippodrome in PARIS was bombed on 1 or 2 September 1943 and missed entirely. On 4 September the Camions were still in the truck-park. (chs.) During the same raid an apartment building near the Montparnasse station was demolished. (character) CAUDRON
- b. Observed raids on Called-Renault and Citroen plants. The Renault plant was destroyed and part of the Citroen factory was destroyed 16 September. On the following day these two targets were still burning. Three Forts were seen to explode in mid-air over PARIS on these raids. The day after the Renault and Cardron-Renault factories were destroyed (12 September) a Flying Fortress was seen flying at an altitude of 1000 feet over PARIS. It flew between barrage balloons. Even with good binoculars the number, though still on the tail fin, was not distinguishable. The American Star was the only insignia on the plane. The plane flew directly over anti-aircraft batteries in BELLEVUE.
- c. Near ba CULPTE, north of TOULOUSE, some Jugoslav officers refused to go to the Russian Front and shot several German officers. The Jugoslavs were executed. (hearsay)
- do When news of the ITALIAN surrender came over BBC the Germans immediately started a check on all railway stations to 'freeze' any movement toward ITALY. (hearsay)
- e. At the first railway station south of TOULOUSE a very large training field was seen. It is located on the west side of the tracks when travelling to FOIX and is near the station of this small town. The number of personnel seemed unusually large. (obs.)
