Sgt. Nekervis landed on 12 June 1944 near NORVILLE (S.I.). Two French boys led him to a barn where they hid him and two which they brought two men who brought him civilian clothes and led him to the farmhouse of one of these men in Rotticic MONVILLE. The next day he left on his own when he was warned by the farmer's wife that the Germans were searching the region for him. He then walked to VATTEVILLE LAR LARUE(15 kms SSW of YVETOT) where GEORGES BENET kept him for two days. BENET'S sun then undertook to guide him on his way, But Nekervis got separated from his guide mn the road and wandered into NOTRE DAME DE GRAVENCHAN (18 kms SW of YVETOT). There he stopped at the bicycle shop of M. CAVE to ask for a drink. Mme CAVE called in M. PRENOST, a slightly bald man of 54 years who speaks English. After M. PRENOST had interrogated him, he stayed with the CAVEs from 16 June until 31 August. On that day the British troops entered the town, and Nekervis made arrangements with a sergeant in Lieut. Kaapengarde of the Dutch Forces took him to a liaison officer who sent him back to Canadian H. where he saw a representative of IS 9 and was given transportation by air to U. K. Nekervis reported at 63 Brook St., London on 3 September.
