- 1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.

SECRET

HTT BY FLAK Our target on 14 June was an airfield near Paris. It was so overcase that we could not bomb the field; so we went for our secondary target. The bombay doors were open when we were hit by flak, and the control cables were severed.

The pilot gave us orders to bale out somewhere in the vincinity of Provins. Henson, Long, Goldsborough, Miller and myself all landed in the same area, near a little village called Bannost.

Some Frenchmen were waiting for us when we hit the ground, and we were all in their hands within about 10 minutes.

GET HELP FROM FRENCH Henson and I were taen by the French to a little alfalfa field where we hid our equipment and stayed until that night. After dark a wagon filled with hay came by and food was tossed to us by the driver. That same night we were taken to a cafe in Bannost where we found Long, Goldsborough and Miller safe in the hands of the French. We stayed in a room above this cafe for three days.

on 17 June a woman who could speak English came to see us and made arrangements to have us taken to deserted farmhouse. We had been given civilian clothes while we were still in the alfalfa field. The deserted farmhouse we were taken to was almost an arsenal—it contained all sorts of arms and ammunition that the French had been storing. We were left there to guard the place, each of us having been given a sub-machine gun and a .45 pistol.

We were later taken to Nangis where we stayed for five days in a room above a sugar refinery. (Nangis, S-5107, 1/250,000, France)

GESTAPO SEARCHES HOMES Henson and I left Mangis about 21 June, with Miller, Long and Coldsborough staying behind. We were taken to Montigny (X-6694). On 18 June the Cestapo from Bray sur Seine to search homes in Montigny, and we had to be moved again.

On 22 June we rode 140 kilometers by bicycle to Lagny (S-3243). We had to use our benzadrine tablets from our escape kits to keep us going. We stayed there two days and were then moved again, thistime to Dampart (S-3444) where we remained until the American troops arrived.

A priest in Montigny told us that seven RAF men shot down in the vicinity had been buried in the village by the French.

I had left my escape kit and purse in the plane. Henson and I split up the contents of his purse and escape kit. The purse was striped with red. We gave the money to our French helpers, and burned the escape maps. We were both briefed on escape and evasion in England as well as in the States.
