T/Sgt James R DYKES, 34445240, 579/392 Bomb Gp, MIA 29 Jan 44 Intrvd 7 September 1944

About noon on 29 Jan 44 DYKES, who comes from the same crew as MATTSON (F&E) landed in the vicinity of WATERLOO. Almost immediately a boy named MARCEL took him to a farmhouse where he changed clothes, to a cafe, and then to a barn for the night. The next night he went to the house to which the barn belonged. He heard that four of his crew had been picked up (presumably by the organization, inasmuch as he met four later). After about two days he was taken to a road to wait for a car. Te met a schoolmaster and a burgermeister and went to CHAPEL ST LAM-BERT where he stayed with an elderly couple named VandeVILDE. There he met CROUCH McGINLEY, ROSATI, and PALANTONIO, all of his own crew. He stayed about two weeks.

Someone from Brussels brought a tissue form to fill out with casualty information.

He went to NIVELLES with a man from the Ford agency there, stayed during the day, and went to ARQUENNES where he stayed about two weeks with an elderly man and a woman. He received I/P from ROBERT who said that he worked for British Intelligence (short, glasses, 35, dark hair, spoke fair English). He went then to ECAUS-SINES with JULES HUSSO (nice looking, tall, well built, about 30) and stayed for about two weeks in a mill. When some Germans came he left by the back door with JULES. He saemed to have been accompanied by at least two other Americans but he is rather foggy about their identity. He had in the meantime been joined by a sergeant photographer from a B-17 shot down about the week before. He went to a house where he stayed a couple of hours with an old man, woman, and daughter, and then went to another house for the night. He spent the next night in a barn across the street.

He went then to a farm outside of town where he met BRENECHE who seemed tobe from the same crew as the photographer. Apparently the whole group were together up to this point. henext day a gendarme took McGINLEY and DYKES into town, kept them a night at his house, and took them for the next nights to a house where there were a couple of women and one man in some kind of business. They went then to

a house outside town and stayed with an old man and woman about 70 whose son was an escaped P/W. They remained about three weeks. The gendarme who had previous ly sheltered McGINLEY and DYKES took the former someplace and DYKES and some of the others to a farm. From there PALANTONIO and DYKES seem to have gone back to the gendarme's place and then after three or four days back to the farm. they left for BRUSSELS with two men and a woman, One man was about 50, wore h glasses, gray hair; the other was about 24,25; and the woman was young and nice looking. CROUCH, McGINLEY, BRENICHE, and DYKES went by car to BRAINE le COMME and by train to BRUSSELS where they were met by three men. McGINLEY and BRENICHE went together, and CROUCH and DYKES went to the house of one of the men. From here DYK S went alone to a house in Coquelborg staying with FREYME at 16(?) Rue Francois Hellincks, for about three weeks. He was then moved by a GASTON to another house in Brussels, but wasmoved after just a day because of searches for men to work in Germany. GASTON took him to DIBEET to the Cafe de Colonne with LOUIS HEIR-SCHUTTER with whom he satyed for about three weeks. One day when they stock conctrollers came he was moved back to FREYNE where he seems again to have stayed for three or four weeks. He went from there to the village of HERFELINGEN where he also stayed about three weeks.

Early one morning a German patrol came to search houses and he left by the window heading for the field, but he was seen running and was picked up. He was taken to a patrol hq and searched. In the afternoon a Luftwaffe men took him to a place outside of Brussels where he was asked name, rank, serial number, the places where he had some down, and so on. He was searched and then threatened with being shot. His interrogator seemed to be an Unteroffizier. He was taken to St Giles and put with some Englishmen, CHARLIE ——, JACK ———, P/O McSWE NEY, who was apparently a Lancaster P, a TG 3/S t Irving SUMTER who was later sent on to Germany, and an HO, DAYLE))). After about a day he was moved to another sell with a Canadian gunner named JOHNNY, an Australian, and a P or CoP, F/O Bill ELIOT. He met later an American B, Lt Ford BABOICK, with whom was a Canadian named JACOB THUMIER. He also met Siegfried SHEMOLIPSKI, a Polish es—

caped P/W.

After about one mothh he was taken out for another interrogation this time inside Brussels and conducted by the two Unteroffiziere known as CHARLEE and JOHN-NIE. They asked him what he haddone and where he had stayed, charged him with being a spy, and threatened him with being shot or put in a civilian prison. When he still refused to talk he was sent back to pr son and put in a different cell This time he was with a German, an Briton, and an American named MONAHAN who was later sent on to ermany. He was in prison until he was moved to the baggage car from which the group finally escaped.

He left with COUZZENS, and D , hid out until daylight, approached a house, and soon saw a tank column enter the city.

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

- 1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 883.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

- 1. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SEGRET.
- 2. a You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.
 - (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
 - You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
 - c You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
 - d You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.

 No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the

theater.

GERTIFIGATE

I understand that any information concerning my escape or evasion from capture is SEGRET and must not be disclosed to anyone other than the agency designated by A.
