





I bailed out on 15 Jume and landed near VILLANDRAUT (approx 28 miles se of BRODEAUX). Three hours after I landed, I was bidden in a farmhouse by a friendly Frenchman. My co-pilet was soon brought there was soon brought to join a farmhouse was soon brought to join will were taken to the home of JEAN LAFFON in VILLANDRAUT, (Gironde) That night, our waist-gumer, Sgt WILCZEK was brought in and the three and stayed to the two nights. I gave my pistolito M LAFFON.

Three guides came to take us to meet the Maquis. We traveled overnight and went to the farm of M MERIC near GRIGNOLS (approx 45 mis se BORDEAUX. The Maquis had an ammunition dump here. Mme MERIC and here JEANNETTE, daughter were there, Their son was a prisoner of war.

Here we met/six others from our crew. We remained on this farm 5 days and then went to another farm with the Maquis. The Germans were nearby, so we hid in the woods.

We made plans to get to Spain in small groups; so The end of June, Lt BROOKS and Sgt WORKMANleft to make their way to Spain. /

We made plans to get to the Spanish border in small groups, so the end of June LT BROOKS and Sgt WORKMAN Teft. Then Lt DISBROW, ""

Lt CHAMP, and Sgt CAMPBELL Teft. We were planning to go in 4 days later

Later to the fact to an English colonel told us he had radioed Loned don and received orders for us to remain there with the Maquis.

As we were leaving on 12 July, the Magui group was scattered, and we lost contact with them. A farmer took us to REAUP/Lot et Garonne) where we remained a few days with another Magui group. On 14 July we moved with them to SOS. We were being attacked almost daily by the Germans, so Sgts Wilczek, BRASHEAR, GRAHAM, and I went to MEZIN.

WE stayed with GUY SECRE at VILLENEUVE DE MEZIN(Lot et Garonne) for 8 days while we tried to contact the English colonel again. Then we went to AVERON\* BERGELLE where we met Colo HILLAIRE.of the English army. He was not too cordial as the frame MSBROW, CHAMP, and CAMPBELL had gotten drunk. He told us that BROOKS and WORKMAN had been shot. The other three had gotten across the border into Spain.

We sent to TARBES but could get no help. Two weeks later we went to EAUZE, the French milice prison camp, where we were told the trips to Spain were concerned because of the Allied landings in southern France. Accordingly, we went back up to AGEN (Lot et Garonne) where we met Capt MICHEL of the British army and Lt GUY of the American army. They offered to take us north to but lines. Near ST CERE, however, I fell out of the car and broke my arm. I stayed there and received very good medical care, until 6 Sept when I went to TOULOUSE. Here I met an American major who arranged for me to fly back to the UK by way of CASERTA CASABLANCA. I arrived in the UK on 11 Sept 44.

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped

Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-

Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in aneutral country, or release from internment not only FURNISHES USEFUL INFORMATION TO THE ENEMY but also JEOPARDIZES FUTURE ESCAPES, EVASIONS AND RELEASES.
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders.escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

### RESTRICTED

- 1. Because disclosures of information regarding evasion from capture, escape, details of imprisonment, release from internment, and repatriation have been made, the lives and services of fellow soldiers and those who help them have been lost or endangered. All information which you possess on these subjects, including the experiences of others as well as your own, briefings and equipment for evasion and escape, and preparations and other activities in connection therewith, constitutes MILITARY INFORMATION which is classified SECRET by the War Department.
- 2. You will therefore disclose no information whatever, beyond the fact of your return to duty from "missing in action" or "prisoner of war" or "internment", to anyone except the following military officials:
  - a. The first Military Attache to whom you report;
  - b. An officer designated by the Commanding General of an overseas Theatre of Operations;
  - c. The Prisoner of War Branch, MIS, Washington, D.C., the interrogating agency designated by the A/C of S, G-2, War Department General Staff:
- d. Certain other officers holding written authority from the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, to interrogate you.
- 3. You will particularly guard against disclosure of SECRET information to relatives, friends, representatives of the press and radio, and military officials, except as noted in a, b, c and d above.
- 4. In order to protect yourself against disciplinary action, any question involving publicity must be referred BY YOU PERSONALLY to the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS. Washington, D.C.

### CERTIFICATE : SELECTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

I certify that I have read and fully understand all of the foregoing and the Directive of the Secretary of War, 6 Aug 43 (on the reverse side), and will at ALL TIMES hereafter comply fully therewith.

I understand that all information concerning escape, evasion from capture, activities and equipment in connection therewith, and details of imprisonment or release from internment, is SECRET and must not be disclosed to anyone except the military officials specifically designated. I further understand that disclosure to any other person will make me liable to disciplinary action for failure to safeguard MILITARY INFORMATION.

I realize that publicity concerning my experiences, by word of mouth or otherwise, will endanger the lives of many persons and therefore it is my duty to take all possible precautions to prevent it.
