All information which you possess on these subjects, including the experiences of others as well as your own, briefings and equipment for evasion and escape, and preparations and other activities in connection therewith, constitutes MILITARY INFORMATION which is classified SECRET by the War Department.
- 2. You will therefore disclose no information whatever, beyond the fact of your return to duty from "missing in action" or "prisoner of war" or "internment", to anyone except the following military officials:
 - a. The first Military Attache to whom you report;
 - b. An officer designated by the Commanding General of an overseas Theatre of Operations;
 - c. The Prisoner of War Branch, MIS, Washington, D.C., the interrogating agency designated by the A/C of S, G-2, War Department General Staff;
- d. Certain other officers holding written authority from the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, to interrogate you.
- 3. You will particularly guard against disclosure of SECRET information to relatives, friends, representatives of the press and radio, and military officials, except as noted in a, b, c and d above.
- 4. In order to protect yourself against disciplinary action, any question involving publicity must be referred BY YOU PERSONALLY to the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, Washington, D.C.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in aneutral country, or release from internment not only FURNISHES USEFUL INFORMATION TO THE ENEMY but also JEOPARDIZES FUTURE ESCAPES, EVASIONS AND RELEASES.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders.escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this direction which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

on 5 May 1944 REITMEIER landed N of CHENAY le CHATEL (N of ROANNE). He had bailed out at about 2500 and his chute did not open until he was about 150' from the ground. He hit on his feet, was thrown on his chest and dazed. He seemed to until have cracked a vertebra. He walked S to daylight, slept in the woods, and was too sick to continue that night so he stayed where he was until 1600 the next day. He then walked toward CHENAY le CHATEL and while he was circling the town he met three found French boys whosoon discovered that he was an American aviator and took him to a house. There he ate, slept a bit, and then bacycled to MARCIGNY with one man. He stayed at a farm than night and the next. The next day he went to LODDES with ANTOINE BUFFET, at whose home he stayed for the next 35 days. He met a great many young people preparing to leave LaPALWESE to get arms. A boy seput from LYON took casualty information.

ANTOINE took him to ROANNE by train. On the way they met Mile PICARD. They met GEGI, a British Intelligence Agent, a Major, and DUDU, a captain who was working with him. He also met the RO, RENE. He went to M BOSSONADE, 153 Rue de Paris, ROANNE and stayed 30 days. Lt John MEAD (B of crew) was there when he arrived. They met BOBO, the head of French intelligence for the section, who sent information to Algiers. REITMELÆER had three x-rays of his back taken preparatory to an operation (which seems not to have taken place).

BOSSONADE was taken by the Gestapo and sent to St ETIMME where he was later liberated by the FFI just an hour before the Germans were going to shoot him.

MEAD left to go on the Maquis. When REITMEIER left the house after the capture of his host he had the fortune to run into GIGI and PIERRE of the house. The latter took him to his fiancee's. The then stayed two days with a dentist, M PLACE, Rue Francisque Rochard. He went by truck to a Maquis at FRAGNY and staye there about two weeks giving instructions in arms. The group dispersed on a false alarm. REITMEIER's back was bad and he was sent to a farmhouse belonging to

ROBERTONSON (questionable spelling) on Rue Nationale 7, NV of St SYMPHORIEN. He stayed there two weeks and say a great deal of the RO RENE. RENE took him to M MENOIT who lived at St POLQUES and he stayed about two weeks there. Another RO was there CHARLES/REGIN CHRISTRAN, 126 Rue des Monts Clairs, Colombes (Seine).

The FFI decided to liberate the place. MEAD and DUDU came and for nine days he stayed in a hotel at ROANNE. It seemed that Col Hefflin had relieved MEAD of They duty with the Maquis. // were going to start toward Cherborug, but GIGI advised waiting. They met an OSS major with a P-38 P who had been shot down N of Parus. He was going to St ETIENNE to reach the FFI. They major wanted them to accompany him but decided that it was probably just as wise for them to stay where they were.

When they heard that LYON was liberated they started over, driving, in spite of DUDU's disapproval. On the way they ran into two US intelligence men, so described, who were supposed to be picking up booby traps and Gestapo agents:

W W French, Collingwood, NJ, and Harold Barker, 765 Parke Ave, NYC. The next day they left for Twelfth Air Force Hq where they talked to Col HULL. MEAD was held over by some general who wanted to send him back to France. Reitmeier returned by way of SALON, CASERTA, and CASABLANCA.
