On 7 jan 44 WENDT hit the ground hard N of DESVRES (Pas de Calais) after making an excellent delayed jump from 7000'. He walked about 2 km, got in a barn, and hid there for four days. On the fifth night a boy brought him food and gave him civilian clothes. About 0500 the next morning he started S on back roads. He went to St Pol and down the route nationale to Amiens. taking four days to get there, getting food in restaurants where he could, and sleeping in barns. "e went through Breteuil, Clermont, and S of Creil. Near Senlis he got a bicycle andbicycled E of Paris to Melun and on to Fontainbleau and Montargis continuing to Nevers and to Moulin where he took the wrong road and then cut over to a town N RIOM. There he got food in a restaurant and got a hair cut. A man who was in resistance work discovered that he was an American and took him home. This trip had taken about nine days. He was given more clothes by the man who had picked him up. e heard later that this man was killed by the Germans.

About 1 Feb he was taken to a village near Chateauneuf where he met George Hurst and Eric Brearley, British. A Luxembourgbois brought two Englishmen down from Luxemburg, and A French cook and another man were th there. A Belgian chef got the food. About 3 April a resistance chief known as the Duc or the Prince took them to a Maquis near Pontaumur (Puy de Dome). After about nine days they met three Canadians: F/Lt Mason, W/O Nelmes, and Sgt Columbus. Sgt Norrie Lea seems also to have joined. On an alert they moved near RUINES, SE of St FLOUR (Puy de Dome). After a couple of weeks an Australian named Buchnanan joined and an Englishman named Fearman. moved about a bit. They had heard of an American Ist t, Jacques Lebaige, an English major, and a French Capt Swan who were working with the Maguis and met them. They moved to a place near CHAMPON and Mont Mouchet and built a cabin there separate from the Maquis group. and Russell, Ed. Major Weinbrenner came in last on 8 June ac ompanied by a Belgian. From there on his story is the same as Weinbrenner's, See EdE.

With great initiative and daring Sgt Wendt made his own way from the Pas de Calais where he landed down to Riom in central France. He was given help by Frenchmen who later directed him to a Maquis group. From April to Sept 1944 he rendered great service to the French Forces of the Interior, instructing their men in the use of American arms and amounition and doing this at great risk to himself and in spite of difficulties of language and enemy interference. In his evasion he displayed unusual courage, determination, and leadership.

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped SUBJECT: Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-

Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

TO: The Commanding Generals,

> Army Ground Forces; Army Air Forces;

The Commander-in-Chief, Southwest Pacific Area;

The Commanding Generals,

Theaters of Operations; Defense Commands; Departments;

Base Commands:

The Commanding Officers. Base Commands;

Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in aneutral country, or release from internment not only FURNISHES USEFUL INFORMATION TO THE ENEMY but also JEOPARDIZES FUTURE ESCAPES, EVASIONS AND RELEASES.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders.escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, 6-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

RESTRICTED

- 1. Because disclosures of information regarding evasion from capture, escape, details of imprisonment, release from internment, and repatriation have been made, the lives and services of fellow soldiers and those who help them have been lost or endangered. All information which you possess on these subjects, including the experiences of others as well as your own, briefings and equipment for evasion and escape, and preparations and other activities in connection therewith, constitutes MILITARY INFORMATION which is classified SECRET by the War Department.
- 2. You will therefore disclose no information whatever, beyond the fact of your return to duty from "missing in action" or "prisoner of war" or "internment", to anyone except the following military officials:
 - a. The first Military Attache to whom you report;
 - b. An officer designated by the Commanding General of an overseas Theatre of Operations;
 - c. The Prisoner of War Branch, MIS, Washington, D.C., the interrogating agency designated by the A/C of S, G-2, War Department General Staff;
- d. Certain other officers holding written authority from the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, to interrogate you.
- 3. You will particularly guard against disclosure of SECRET information to relatives, friends, representatives of the press and radio, and military officials, except as noted in a, b, c and d above.
- 4. In order to protect yourself against disciplinary action, any question involving publicity must be referred BY YOU PERSONALLY to the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, Washington, D.C.

I further understand that disclosure to any other person will make me liable to disciplinary action for failure to safeguard MILITARY INFORMATION.

I realize that publicity concerning my experiences, by word of mouth or otherwise, will endanger the lives of many persons and therefore it is my duty to take all possible precautions to prevent it.
