- 1. Because disclosures of information regarding evasion from capture, escape, details of imprisonment, release from internment, and repatriation have been made, the lives and services of fellow soldiers and those who help them have been lost or endangered. All information which you possess on these subjects, including the experiences of others as well as your own, briefings and equipment for evasion and escape, and preparations and other activities in connection therewith, constitutes MILITARY INFORMATION which is classified SECRET by the War Department.
- 2. You will therefore disclose no information whatever, beyond the fact of your return to duty from "missing in action" or "prisoner of war" or "internment", to anyone except the following military officials:
 - a. The first Military Attache to whom you report;
 - b. An officer designated by the Commanding General of an overseas Theatre of Operations;
 - c. The Prisoner of War Branch, MIS, Washington, D.C., the interrogating agency designated by the A/C of S, G-2, War Department General Staff;
- d. Certain other officers holding written authority from the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, to interrogate you.
- 3. You will particularly guard against disclosure of SECRET information to relatives, friends, representatives of the press and radio, and military officials, except as noted in a, b, c and d above.
- 4. In order to protect yourself against disciplinary action, any question involving publicity must be referred BY YOU PERSONALLY to the A/C of S, G-2, WDGS, Washington, D.C.

CERTIFICATE

I certify that I have read and fully understand all of the foregoing and the Directive of the Secretary of War, 6 Aug 43 (on the reverse side), and will at ALL TIMES hereafter comply fully therewith.

SUBJECT: Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

- 1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in aneutral country, or release from internment not only FURNISHES USEFUL INFORMATION TO THE ENEMY but also JEOPARDIZES FUTURE ESCAPES, EVASIONS AND RELEASES.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders.escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

set Collier came down on 6 May 1944 one km SW of MARCIGNY (25 kms N of ROANNE). He walked S and that there morning approached a farmer who hid him in a patch of woods and that night brought him food and blankets. The next day the farmer returned with a man of the maquis, and the two of them led Collier to the farmer's house where he lived three days. The man who had picked up Lit. Simon then came and took Collier to ROANNE to the home of a family named POULLY, two men, 23 and 28 years old who lived with their mother. With them Collier lived fived days, after which the man who had brought him there returned with two maquisards and took him by train to ST ETIENNE (LOIRE), where he stayed one night in the house of a woman who had handled many American evaders, and thence by train to CHAMBON and by truck to MAZET ST VOY (HAUTE LOIRE) to a maguisard chief, a capatin in the French army who had that is red moustache and wore glasses. Thence the Collier and his guide walked to ST FRONT (18 kms S of YSSINGEAUX, HAUTE LOIRE) where Collier was put into a hotel for one night and then was taken to the house of PIERRE GLOST and his father, two kms W of ST FRONT. It was with the uncle of PIERRE GLOST that Lt. Russell, whom Collier met in the hotel at ST FRONT, was staying. Collier lived with PIERRE GLOST and his father two weeks. From that point Collier's story is the same as Lt. Russell's (E&E 828) until to 10 June when the maguis in which they were staying was threatened by a German attack and the 17 evaders left. From that point && Collier's story is the same as that of Major George Weinbrenner (ELE 2060) until they reached BOMAN FONTANNES (HAUTE LOIRE. No. There are three towns of this name in HAUTE LOIRE, Childe one in LOIRE, and none of this hame or any remotely similar name in PUY DE DOME, in which department Collier thinks that the place was situated!). There Major Weinbrenner knew a man who put Collier and Sgt. Hurst into a maquis which was commanded by PAUL COUTEL who went by the name of JEAN-MARIE. After they had been a day here the Germans attacked the camp, and the two Americans left with one group of the maquis led by a chief called COBRA.

marched three nights, and camped in a wood NW of BERCOUDE (HAUTE LOIRE). On 10 July COBRA turned the Americans over to another group which was going to take them to SWITZERLAND. With this group they remained in a town SE of CHAMPAGNAC LE VIEUX (HAUTE LOIRE) until 12 August. On that day they accompanied the maquis into BRIOUDE which they occupied. On the same day M. DOUCHET, a professor of English by ho has a daughter named JACQUELINE, approached them and offered to get them a guide to take them to SPAIN. The next day, however, the Germans approached BRIOUDE, and so M. DOUCHET took the three Americans with his family to AGNAT (HAUTE LOINE) where he quartered them with a family named MONTAINIENNE (spelling?) with whom Maj. Weinbrenner had stayed. On 19 August M. DOUCHET took the three Americans back to his own home in BRIOUDE. They lived with him for two days; but then, since the guide whom M. DOUCHET was expecting did not appear, JEAN-MARIE came and took them to the CHATEAU DE LAVAL at LES CREZES where his group was quartered. They lived at this chateau until about 1 September, when JEAN-MARIE gave them a laissez-passer and sent them to BRASSAC LES MINES (FUY DE DOME) where they met Maj Weinbrenner again. In BRASSAC LES MINES Weinbrenner was staying with MLIE. LUCIENNE BRIAT; Collier and latta lived with the family of M. RAPP. From this point their journey was the same as that of Maj. Weinbrenner (E & E 2060).
