On the way to our target we were attacked by fighters. A few mintues after the first attack had been driven off, more fighters than had been in the first attack appeared in front of our aircraft, and, in single file they made head-on attacks. Our number one and two engines received direct hits and number three was ailing. I shot a flare to attract our fighter cover. Because my inter-phone connections were unhooked, I did not hear the order to bale out, I saw the bombardier, navigator and co-pilot in the nose, preparing to leave. As soon as I had my chute adjusted, I went to the nose, with the pilot following behind me, and jumped. The aircraft was on AFCE.

I was out from above 20000 feet and meant to delay my jump, but, after DRING FALL fifteen seconds I began to feel dizzy so I pulled the rip cord. I saw a large town below me but realized that I was drifting away from it.

> I hit the ground in a field which bordered a river. There were some people several hundred yards away - all yelling at me. As soon as I had gotten out of the chute I ran along the river, paying no attention to the people, and, stopped once to hide my chute and the West in the some brush. About three hundred yards from where I had come down there was a bridge which I crossed because there were high fences ahead of me bid I stayed on that side of the river. Coming off the bridge I ran into a large crowd of people who were shouting, "Deutsh," and "Allemagne," at me. It was impossible to tell what else they were saying and at the time I didn't know what those two words meant. In any case, from their frantic gestures, I would not have known which way to go.

I turned left xxxxxxx when I crossed the bridge to get away from the people. The women were holding thexekildrenxham back the children who wanted to follow One boy darted from the crowd and tagged at my heels though I tried to shake him off. He kept asking me whether I were German or Dutch; I understood that much though he was not speaking English. Finally, in irritation, I told him that I was an American. When he heard that he put his hand on my arm and stopped me, saying that he could help me. I followed him off the road and up an

embankment where he hid me in some brush. I was not more than a hundred yards from the bridge I had crossed, and, had a good view of the countryside in which I had parachuted. Before the boy left I understood that I was to stay there until he returned.

SEARCH BY POLICE

Not more than a few minutes after he had disappeared policemen appeared on the scene and started to search. At first they were over in the fields where I had come down and the one of them found my chute and flying boots. He held to up and called to all the others, who joined him. Then they searched along the river bank, and finally worken around to the side of the river where I was hiding. Some civilians joined the police and they went through the wood in which I was hiding civilians with great care. One of the pulitement almost stepped on me though I had burrowed THINKS PART as far under the brush as I could get. He gave no indication of knowing that I of Span was hidden in the brush, but, from the g diligence of his search and the diligence with which he avoided the exact spot where I lay, I felt that he knew I was there.

> After the searchers left the wood I crawled back where I could see the road again. A policeman was patrolling it; and passing within my sight every few minutes. Another policeman was on the bridge and an hour later, a German officer walked up to him. They talked for about thirty minutes; and, before the German officer left he fired several revolver shots into the brush on the hillside above

me. The policemen kept up their patrolling, and, at dusk my friend crawled up to me through the bushes. While he did this a friend of his distracted the policeman on the bridge by getting him into conversation. A lot of funny business had gone on which I had not understood but I think some of the police knew where I was hidden because I saw them talking to the children, shaking their head and pointing their finger, as if warning the children about something, rather than asking them questions.

When my friend crawled up to me he handed me a watch and pointed to 2200 hours on the dial, indicating he would return then. He was back at that time with three JOURNEY Touk. Two of them had bicycles. We cycled, two on a bike, to an old stone quarry about a quarter of a mile distance where I changed into civilian clothes. We cycled on to a house then where the rest of my journey was arranged.
