- 3. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
- 4. a. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations:

(1) The names of those who helped you.

(2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.

(3) The route you followed.

(4) Any other facts concerning your experience.

- b. You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the Press.
- c. You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- d. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in beautisection, except as specifically directed in Par. 4a.
- e. No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of the War or Navy Department.

JUST BEFORE GERMANS CAME

The afternoon of 15 September 1943 we took off from SNETTERTON HEATH to bomb the Hispano-Suiza works near Paris. We test-fired our guns at altitude and found everything in good order. Crossing the Channel, we met our escort, which I think was P-47's, but I did not pay much attention to them. Everything went smoothly to the bomb run. Just as we opened the bomb doors we were hit by the first burst of flak I had seen. Number one engine seemed to be hit in the center; I thought the gas line was bunctured. An enormous flame shot out. I reported that number one was ond fire and that we should be prepared for anything. In a matter of seconds the pilot gave the order to bail out and turned on the alarm bell. I blew the radio set, stuck the radio papers in my mouth, grabbed my chute, and rushed to the wing broke off at Number one engine. bomb bay. After pulling the emergency on the door to the rear of the waist I jumped out. No sooner was I out than the plane exploded. I delayed my jump from 22,000 to 16,000 or 17,000 feet. After my chute opened I heard another explosion which I thought as another plane, exploding, but which might have been ours again. I saw one other cute in the air.

While I floated down, I saw that I was heading for a river, so I spilled my chute as I had been instructed and moved away from the river. I crossed a railway about 15 feet from the yard and a station and landed in a woods not far away, hanging in a tree / ground. About eight Frenchmen rushed toward me from the railroad yard. I come from a Fre French speaking family, so I asked them in French if anyone had a knife. When one of them threw me a knife. I cut a few strands of the chute and dropped to the The Frenchmen told me to disappear in a hurry, for the Germans were gground. I started to pull my chute down, but they said that they would destroy it and started to pull it down and cut it up. They warned me to go west, and not east.

I ran about 100 yards and hid in some tall grass beneath some lowhanging heavily armed branches of a tree. When I had scarcely settled down, I saw three Germans come They asked the Transhier / here I / has I could see and hear them ask the Frenchmen where I was. The Frenchmen h d alwready destroyed my parachute, and

BUT THEY MISSED HIM they pointed in all directions. The Germans seemed uncertain which direction to go and headed straight for me. They passed within six feet of me, walked on, and then came back and passed on the other side of me. They passed me several more times, then disappaeared. I thought I had better stay where I was, for I feared they might leave some men in the vicinity. About 25 or 30 minutes later I saw two Germans come from behind trees not far away. I was happy that I had not moved. After they disappeared I still stayed where I was and did not move until midnight when the moun rose.

WALKED ALL NIGHT

I started out through the woods carefully, cifered around the place where I had come down, and reached a//pad the rail road. Several trains passed. I followed the road some distance back from it until about 0600, walking 50 or 60 yards without bring and then listening, keeping the road always in view / but never visible from it. About daylight I ran into a blackberry patch and enjoyed the first full meel I had had since early the day before,. As it became lighter, I ent deeper into the I came to a path and head north, farther 'nto the woods, instead of west as I had been going. I walked carefully until 0900, regularly stopping to listen for any sounds of danger.

I could hear someone chopping. I moved on quietly and saw two young men: I watched them for some time and heard them speak French to each other. I thought that one chance was a good as the next, so I approached them, told them who I was, and asked them if they could get me some civilian clothing. I was then wearing. my flying coveralls and GI shoes //. I had buried my flying suit in the woods after cutting all my name tags off. The two Frenchmen seemed a little suspicious of me SUSPICIOUS BECAUSE because I spoke French. I showed them my GI trousers and undershirt, but they still seemed uncertain. I had hid one dog tag in the heel of my shoe --- where I left it until I reached Spain -- but I showed them my other one, and they seemed satsified that I was all right.

BUT HELPED HIM

"e walked a bit to a house where they gave me some food. I ate sparingly of it because I had had little to eat and did not want to get sick from eating too much too soon. They seemed to be pretty poor people, too, and I did not want to eat

all their meagre rations. They insisted that I sats for dinner, and were most generous to me, sharing with me everything they had, which was little indeed.
