We were returning from the raid on Stuttgart. (See E + E Report to 222)

I didn't hear the order to bale out and was still firing when I saw a chute open behind our plane. Then, when I country four chutes I went to the tail and jumped. My heated-suit cord caught on something and held me in the door for a second but I jerked at it until it tore loose. I was out around 18000 feet, but pulled the rip cord as soon as I had cleared the plane. There was another 'Fort' near us under attack; and I watched the though I never did see any chutes. From it. I was over a large village and pulled at the shroud lines to get more drift, but, at 10000 feet I went into a rain cloud and had no visiblity again until 5000 feet. There were open fields below me and I landed in a field.

As soon as I touched the ground a fighter swooped over my head but went away without circling me. I gathered in my chute, a hid it in some hay, and started for a small village about half a mile away. I followed a hedge-row to keep out of sight but when I reached the end, of it and, started to cross a fence, there was a woman standing there waiting for me. She had followed my jump with binoculars and had come out of the village to meet me. She hid me in a ditch immediately, and told me to wait forckers while she got clothes and food. When she was out as sight I changed my hiding place that I could see her when she returned. About thirty minutes later she come back with another woman. This convinced me that she meant to help, so I whistled at her. After I had changed in the clothes, I was taken to a garden where a hiding place was fade for me. I was to stay here until the woman's husband returned that night, and then talk to him.

When he came I talked to him for a few minutes and then was taken in the house. Because I had eaught a bad cold they insisted I go to bed; and I stayed in bed a week, being treated for the cold. At the end of that time I told the woman I was going to leave but she said I couldn't until she had found some help for

me. I knew there was a young man, who could help me, coming often to visit my helpers, and, finally I discovered that the woman had not told him anything about me.

I insisted that she do this, and, eventually when she saw that I meant to start out on my own, she told the young Frenchman. Until this time my presence in the house waxxwex was known only to three people. When I learned that the young Frenchman was working to get help for me I waited more patiently, and, at the end of another month a man, xxxxx who arranged my journey, came to see me.
