Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

The Commanding Generals,

Army Ground:

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

- Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SEGRET.
- You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.
 - (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
 - You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
 - You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4. No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the theater.

GERTIFIGATE

I have read the above and certify that I will comply with it.

I understand that any information concerning my escape or evasion from capture is SEGRET and must not be disclosed to anyone other than the agency designated by A. C. of S., G-2, War Department, the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations, or to the Military Attache in a neutral country to whom I first report. I understand that disclosure to anyone else will make me liable to disciplinary action.

Kenneth S. Stiles 5/sgt. 38366661 2624 397th Bm. Sp. 599th Sqdn. APO-140 MIAgang - UK 5 Nor. by E.L.D. On aug. 9, 1944 our B-26-F crashed in enemy territory at Courtain, FRANCE mes Chartres. We had been senerly damaged by flak, both engines were enoperatine and the pilot was wounded. No one bailed out. The french meached the plane before the Germans but me mere too badly wounded of escape. It. Hesser · co - pilat - died on way to hospital. The pilot and enlisted-hombordies were said to be dead by the Germans. The nemainder of the crew was taken to the Hospital de la Pitie, Boulevard de Hospitals, Paris, France. The Dermans acked name; wank and serial number but no more. We were place in care of the French when the F.F.S. found Basio. Food and medicine much short non-existent - but Gumans showed no cruelty. When amexicans arrented we were inacuated to U. K. on Aug. 30, 1944.

Near Chartres

Crashed Aug 9, 19 x4 in cremy territory We were briefed for amission to bomb a bridge across the Siene somewhere Northwest of Paris. Five minutes after bombs away "we were hit at 12,000 ft. by flak. The pilot and the right enoine were rendered in active. The co-pitat took over, feathered the engine and the ship came down to 800 ft. before it leveled off. At 800 ft the left engine went and the co-pilot tried a deal stick landing but the right wing stabled out first, so that we struck the ground on our Right wing. En Listel toggler" was in co. p. Lots seat and wounded pitot was on back in Radio compartment, Tail ounner was dumping excess weight out of tail section and I was standing on flight deck.

The French reached the plane before the German but wewere too badly wounded to escape. I was sure of the death of ht. Hesser-co-pilot on way to German Hospital. The Pilot and Enlisted bombadien were said to be dead by the Germans. Remainder of crew was taken to Hopital dela Pitie, Booloana de Hopitals, Paris, France. The Germans Asked our name rank and serial number but did not ask more, We were placed in care of the French when the F.I. freed Paris, Food and medicine were Almost Non-existent, but they Germans did not show show cruelty. Later when Americans Arrived we were evacuated to UK.
