SUBJECT: Safeguarding of P/W Information.

TO : Personnel concerned.

- 1. It is the duty of all Americans to safeguard information which might, either directly or indirectly, be useful to the enemy.
- 2. It is an offense, carrying heavy penalties, to publish or to communicate to any unauthorized person any information which might be useful to the enemy.
- 3. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
- 4. a. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations:

(1) The names of those who helped you.

(2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.

(3) The route you followed.

(4) Any other facts concerning your experience.

- b. You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press. c. You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- d. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in convergation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4a.
- e. Mo lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of the Mar or Navy Department.

I had been told to avoid large cities and keep to small ones, but it seemed to me that one had less trouble in large cities than in small ones. I did not realize, however, that this advice meant to avoid large cities only if one was on his own.

The GI shoe is best for hiking, but its rubber soles and heels are easily noticed, as are the markings on the side of the shoes. I wore my GI shoes under my flying boots.

Statement of information covering the period from 12 October 1943 to 26 ecember 1943.

- a. The speech by General SMUTS on the future of France seemed to be most ill timed, espeially for those legitles who were being helped by the French. The French place seems thoroughly to expect that France will be a great power after the war, and those who are helping British and Americans think that part of the work is directed to the end of preserving France's greatness. Frenchmen whom informant met were appalled by the brutal misunderstanding of the SMUTS/ speech.
- b. The railway tracks between Paris and BREST were frequently blown up. (Hearsay and observation)
- c. In RHEIMS bridges were blown up on four successive Sundays in October and November. (Hearsay))
- d. Informant saw White Russian soldiers in BREST in November and December. There were supposed to be about 200 of them, and they were said to be actively assisting the Germans. (Hearsay and observation)
- e. New German balland barracks were being built in November and December near LANNILIS. (Observation)
- f. Large number of German aviators are supposed to be stationed at an airfield near St DIZIERS; many of the bestpilors were supposed to be there. 'Hearsay)

We met little flak going into the coast to bomb SCHWEINFURT on 14 October 1943.. About 1313 we had engine trouble, a run away propellor on number three engine. The pilot did not feather the engine.. We had trouble keeping up with the formation, so the pilot ordered the bombardier to drop the boms. We dropped them over Ger many but not on a town and did no damage. We caught up with the formation and for some reason passed it, and then turned right from it .. Either the interphone was out or els there was so much noise that we could not hear; at any rate, the pilot passed me a note asking whether we should head for home or for Switzerland. plotted a course to byth both places, so I passed back the informa-The pilot decided to head for home. We were attacked by fighters, and when they dropped us three or five more picked us up, 190's, 109's, and a Ju 88. The bombardier and engineer thought they were firing rockets at us, but I just did not know. They shot up the ball turret and the top turret, and I think that the oxygen tank in the bomb bay was hit and set on fire. The pilot gave the orer to bail out, hit the beel, and then cancelled the or-I understod that he gave 11/4/\$/ the order a second time, but - did not hear it .. When I looked back in the plane, I saw some mone going out the escape hatch and realized that the orer had been given again. I went out the nose first; Brown the navigator, co-pilot, engineer, and pilot were supposed to come after me. I did not know anything about the boys in back. In the air I saw only one other chute, whichwas Bronner's .. We were passed by a German fighter, but it did not fire..

I lost purse and escape kit in my fall. I landed in a tree, which broke my fall, and then had a lot of trouble pulling my chute out of the tree. I dug a hole, and stuck my chute in it, and

Sunset came in about three hours, and I began to get cold. I started back to the places where I had left my chute and my clothes, hoping to use them for warmth, but I could not find either. I came to a hill, saw a little red house in the distance, and started toward it.. About 20 feet from a road I heard marching feet and ducked in time to avoid a section of 15 Germans. I went back to the place where I had been hiding and found a woman tending cows. I revealed myself toher, and she motioned for me to stay where - was.. Her husband brought me a pitch fork and told me to "Allez!" It seemed to me that people were always telling me to "Altez" in France, but I alays moved along amicably when they directed me.. We went to the farmer's house in the village, and my hosts fed me.. I wanted some water, but when I tried to explain my request, they thought that I was criticisng the wine and thre out what we had and brought some other wine. Later in the evening I managed to get some water.. I was told that I would leave by airplane in four days.. I soon found that everone was given this story, and that none went out by the mode of transpor any more than I.
