- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or 2 communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.

I was top turret gunner in the crew from which Sgts SCHMITT and SULLI-VAN have returned. (See E&E 344-345.) Our trouble began after the target when numbers one and two engines rent out. We went into a bank. Before I knew it, the bomb bay doors were open, and I saw the bombardier on the catewalk ready to jump. When I saw the navigator go out, I went down to jump, but I did not want to go At first.

DELAYED SUMP

I had learned to delay my jump, so I did not pull the rip cord until I hit the clouds. My harness fitted loosely, and I received and awful jolt. The wind knocked me around a bit. I could easily see a couple of forests and a town. I saw that I was going to hit in a tree top. I kicked and fell clear. My parachute caught in the tree, and I had some trouble jerking it down. I ran 200 or 300 yards with all of my equipment and then buried my parachute, mae west, and helmet. I heard dogs howling and ran into a forest. I could not seem to get out of it. I hid in a ditch and took a benzadrine tablet. After that I really ran. I must have gone eight kidometers or so.

When I came to an opening where I saw a farmer ploughing, I lay in hiding for a couple of hours watching. When I saw no one else around, I signaled to the farmer. When he came to me, I explained, "Je suis aviateu americain." He said that he had seen me parachute. I said that I was hungry and asked for civilian clothes. The farmer gave me some food and said that his wife would bring some food and clothing in the evening. 15 or 20 minutes later a crew member came up. About 1800 a woman brought a pair of trousers and some bread.

us to a hayloft. To our great surprise we ran into Sgts SCHMITT and SULII escape
-van. We studied our maps and decided to head for PARIS. I do not recall that we had ever been briefed not to go to Paris, and we certainly did not realize then what an extremely dangerous thing to do it was. I smoked the first cigarette that I had had since I came down.

Just before sun we we split up and started of walking across the fields, but we kept meeting the other men. Finally we gave them an hours start to make certain that we would not stick close to them and be too large and dange ous a group. When we came to a highway we ran into a man walking. We walked on and crossed a single track railroad, we and followed it five or six kilometers to a small village. We were most lungry and had a debate whether we should go in or around the village. I advised going through; the finally my crew member agreed, and we walked through the village in our flying clothes except for my civilian trousers. A man followed us and approached us on the other side of the village, took us to a house. When we told him who we were, he gave us complete civilian clothing.

From the place my journey was arranged.

- 1. The following information has been obtained from a sergeant who evaded capture in enemy occupied territory.
- 2. Further circulation of this information may be made, but in that case it is important not to divulge any details about the source.

Statement of information covering the period from 30 December 1943 to 13 anuary 1944 for A most part

- a. Informant was told by a most reliable source that in the town of VIRNON on one day there were some 450 case of VD and on another 175, Apparently the cases were just German troops.
- b. Informant was told that the following three railroad junctions are most important for troop. Movements and supplies: JUVISSM, FARASCON

HELPEP

SOURNEY GED ARRANGED (sic), and St PIERRE de COYES (sic). The first is used for transportation to Paris, the second for eastern France, and the third for southern France. Informant's source urged these junction as military targets.

- c: Informant was told that the area between AUBERVILLE and St DENIS was considerably damaged by bombing and that three bridges south of St DENIS were constructed temporary bridges to take their place.
- d. Informant was told that the airport of ARGONNE was completely destroyed and that the land down to the cemetery was also bombed considerably
- e. Informant was also told that Le BOURGET was completely demolished.
- f. In the BORDEAUX railroad station, informat which was crowded with erman soldiers informant a good many young troops. He was struck by the general appearance of sloppiness both in clothing and in conduct.
- g. Informant was told that the Germans have rocket gun installations in the Foret B'ISLE ADAM. The projectiles are supposed to be radio operated and are supposed to be capable of hitting london. The projectile is supposed to be shaped like an airplane and to be be fired from an emplacement sunk 80 meters into the ground.
