- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

KNOCKED out by Returning from kxx target we lost two engines from flak. regulator When the supercharger on a third engine went out Lt HORTON told the crew to balf out. When I left my seat I think everyone but the pilot and engineer had jumped. On the way to the CHERRY CHUTE nose hatch I rehearsed mentally perchute drill and checked my harness for fit.

> leaving the plane around 14000 feet I pulled the ripcord when clear of the slipstream. I dropped most of the distance in a violent swing and was airsick. For awhile it looked as if I might fall in a large town but I succeeded / by working the shroudlines in getting enough drift to land, in a woods. There 2 were two chutes above me and, when last seen, the plane was inlevel flight.

- I crossed my legs when falling in the woods and slipped through the branches into the clear, with my chute hung on the top limbs of a tree. I couldn't move rapidly because I was still being sick from dizziness. AT daylight wax after covering the fire with dirt, I checked my compass and maps, put the contentsof the AIDS BOX in my pocket, ate some of the Horlicks and chocolate, buried my personal wallet which had a few English notes in it and started walking toward the church bell.

worrying about being seen in uniform because of a low ground fog. I could not see more than forty feet ahead. After covering about three-quarters of a mile I heard a man plowing and found him by following the sound of his wice. I showed him my wings and said I was an American airman. He understood immediately, told me to wait by the plow and went into an adjoining field to get another farmer.

They discussed the situation and told me to go back in the woods, find my chute and bring it to them about mid-afternoon. I searched hours for the chute and returned to the Barmer without it. He had brought some food and a man who spoke a little broken English. While we were talking another man man ran up to us and in good English told me to follow him.

In a secluded part of the wood He told me to stay hidden until he could return with clothing. He also had bicycles when he came back to take me away. From here my journey was arranged.
