SUBJECT: Safeguarding of P/W Information.

TO : Personnel concerned.

1. It is the duty of all Americans to safeguard information which might, either directly or indirectly, be useful to the enemy.
2. It is an offense, carrying heavy penalties, to publish or to communicate to any unauthorized person any information which might be useful to the enemy.
3. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
4. a. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attaché to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations:
 - (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.b. You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
c. You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
d. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4a.
e. No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of the War or Navy Department.

Coley and I walked south
and three miles from the plane
we were picked up by a farmer. - (tall
blue eyes, brown hair, long nose,
aged about 40) he took me to his
house where was his wife. (short, blonde
hair, brown eyes, a little shorter, aged
about 40) and his 2 children (aged
6 and 7)

The farmer gave us clothes,
ask for our identifications, our
pictures and made identity cards. -

On the 5th January the
farmer took me to BORDEAUX to

a friend's apartment. saw there (aged 35, short brown eyes and brown hair, had two fingers cut off on his right hand.)

~~He was~~ visited by a French ex Pilot who knew the region well and ~~of~~ little basi, (brown hair ~~black~~ very rare, red face blue eyes about 5 feet 7). He knew the region around Bordeaux well said it was impossible to go to Toulouse by rail.

On the 6th January was taken to Farm House 10 miles from Bordeaux. The farmer (grey hair, large black bushy moustache, short stature aged 50 to 60, knew little English) was born in Mississippi. ~~came~~ we took 2 tricycles there and came back to Bordeaux ~~were~~ I stayed to the apartment. From there we went to an other Farm house near SAINS ANSIRE de LUBZAC. We met WILSON (a Liberator navigator shot down on 5th January over Bordeaux) and NATION (who was in NAPP'S crew) The farmer (had only a few teeth left, ugly looking fellow, black bushy hair, blue eyes, ~~was~~ aged about 50, 5 feet seven) ~~had~~ told us that from there on we were with the underground.

On the 8th^{in the afternoon.} we were taken
to a doctor's house in St ANDRE DE CUBZAC.
There we met GOLSTEIN and JANMAN
(who were brought there to see us) the doctor
(the doctor said he had had ~~in his~~ house already
18 Americans before us, had blue eyes,
brown hair, was thin about 5 feet 8, aged
49. - with him was an interpreter, an
English teacher with wavy grey hair, long nose,
5 feet 6, very thin, long face aged 50)

The same ^{we were} taken to another farmer
house 3 miles from St Andre' (the farmer
was a hirsby man, with brown hair, brown
eyes, about 50 years old) his wife was
slightly ugly, had crooked teeth, brown hair
his daughter was ^{aged} 23, brown hair, blue eyes
~~not~~ had a hubby, her husband was
a prisoner of war; he had just escaped
but did not live there. stayed there a
week then moved to an another
farm house. (the farmer a hirsby man
with very dark brown hair, brown eyes
red face, 5 feet seven, his wife: hirsby
grey hair, 5 feet 6, aged 55, his daughter in law
aged 24, good posture, brown hair, nice

While when we were in formation over the channel I reported to pilot of smoke coming out of Number four engine, which also was not vapor trail. The pilot continued on knowing the circumstances. It continued smoking until we were about five minutes from target. At that time the aircraft went out of control - throwing us completely away from formation. We tried to get back in but couldn't. The pilot then told us we were trying for home, but soon found out we couldn't make it. We were going to prepare for ditching but the pilot made up his mind on landing.

SUBJECT: Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

TO: The Commanding Generals,
Army Ground;
Army Air Forces;
The Commander-in-Chief, Southwest Pacific Area;
The Commanding Generals,
Theaters of Operations;
Defense Commands;
Departments;
Base Commands;
The Commanding Officers,
Base Commands;
Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.

2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.

3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attachés are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.

4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.

5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 388.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.


