Delayed Jump

Example After the order to bail out was given I delayed my jump from 7000 feet to 4000 feet, remembering the instructions of our S-2 officer.

I landed beneath a tree with my chute draped over the top

They appeared to be inseparable although I waited a long time hoping I could get one of them off alone, After giving up I moved a back into the wood but it was carpeted with dense thickets and there were no other houses. I made my way to the small house.

WATEHES HOUSE

FINDS FRENCHMAN

This time one of the Frenchmen was alone. I waved to attract his attention and motioned him over to me. While we were trying to understand each other the other Frenchman, who must have seen us from the house, came out and joined us. By pointing the the appropriate phrase on my language car I got food from them. A third Frenchman appeared on the scene xxxxxxxxxxx and hearing who I was became very excited. I thought he was just scared and could understand that he was saying something about the Boche. When he left in a big hurry I got worned and ran off into the woods.

Two hours later I came to the edge of the wood and the adgaxant outskirts of a small village. At the first house I called to a woman working in a small garden. She looked up, recognised me as an Allied airman and came running over to lead me into the house. From there my journey was arranged. Sgt BRESSLER:

I had been briefed to delay my jump. I held it from 7000 feet to 3000 feet, opening my chute then because of the difficulty in watching the ground over my shoulder.

I came down in the top of a kx large tree. The chute caught on the top branches and bashed me against the tree trunk, knocking me silly.

Briefed to Below

JEAVES & CHUTS

Eventually I pulled myself up to a limb, unbuckled the chute harness, and rested there frankskisks until I felt I could hang on long enough to work my way to the ground. I had given a tug# at the chute but it was too firmly lodged. I carried my GI shoes(attached to chute harness) down the tree with me and put them on after burying my flying boots.

After changing my aids box and purse to my inside clothing I looked the blood from around to see what I had better do. At a small stream I washed/my face and tried to improve my appearance.

January 1990

LANGHAGE ES

I had landed in a dense wood but a short walk brought me out to a secondary road. There was no sign of traffic. I followed the road about a hundred yards and then moved back into the forest where I took a compass bearing S and walked for three hours before I found a clearing. There was an old wood cutter here, but we could not understand each other. Leaving him I went into the fields, not caring whether I was caught arms or not, because I was tired and still bleeding badly.

I had crawled into the brush to rest and was watching some peasants at work in the fields when I saw ***mxxxxx** a man working alone *** the edge of wood. I crawled around to him and tried to get help by pointing out the requestion on my lagguage card. Apparently he couldn't read because he with kept shaking his head and studying the card/in a puzzled manner. One of the workers in the field saw us and came running to investigate. He understood immediately and took me to a house. From there my journey was

arranged.

APPENDIX B:

a. Evader heard that ROMMEL's HQ on 13 April was in a hotel near a railway station.

b. French stated that the Germans had requisitioned all large dogs in the PARIS area for use in the front lines. They were to be trained in such a fashion that they could be sent into the Allied lines with time bombs tied to them.

c. Evaders saw severe bomb damage in the yards of the Gare du Nord station at PARIS on 3 May 1944. They counted 23 dam damaged and destroyed locomotives.

d. At CREIL evaders saw bomb damage around the station although the station itself was untouched. All but one track leading into the station had been knocked out, and this stretch of single track covered one mile. A large bridge near the station had not been hit. About 15 army trucks sitting in the yards were damaged. This yard was first seen by evaders on 19 April 1944, and on 3 May 1944 no repairs had been made. In a raid on CRAEL about 20 April the last large crane had been destroyed. (Obs and Hrsy)

e. Evaders were told that the streets in PARIS were prepared for tank barricades. One man pillboxes had been erected on the street corners and some of the streets had been mined.

Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.

- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.
