I landed in a tall tree not far from a road. My chute caught on the top branch leaving me suspended about 60 feet above the ground. There was someone looking directly at me could have found me. I struggled for half an hour before I got enough of a swing in the chute to grab onte a limb.

When I got the chute unbuckled two Frenchmen who had been ke searching for me came running up. I couldn't understand their shouts and signals but I was still stuck in the tree because the lowest branch was too high to jump from and the tree trunk was too big to slide down. Fix

Each time I shifted my weight my leg became more firmly imbedded and finally I couldn't move. I took off some of my clothes and tied my body to the tree trunk to ease some of the pressure.

More than two hours had passed and I was struggling to remain conscious when found me. I heard him yelling at someone and saw Lt JACOBSON and another Frenchman running toward us.

Lt JACOBSON, who looked as if he had been badly injured, yelled at me to hurry up and climb down but when he saw how I was caught he sent one of the Frenchmen for an axe.

From here my story is the same as Lt JACOBSON's.

Lt JACOBSON:

We chopped down a small tree wkknown and pkrown braced it against one of the trees holding the sergeant's leg. By gradually applying our weight we got the trees separated enough to free him. This had taken about fifteen minutes. While Branch rested and tried & to get the circulation started again in his leg the Frenchmen buried his flying equipment and removed the traces of our activity.

We were guided further into the wood where our two friends built a leanto as shelter for the night. They brought food and told us to get up early the next morning and get out of that area. We left our rings and crash bracelets with the Frenchmen.

We got under way about 0530 hours, skirting the woods and following a road.

We saw a cyclist pedalling slowly along the road and waken walked at near enough to him to see that it was one of our French friends. He made us hide in a ditch while he gat went after some hot coffee. We left him again and

had walked about two king when we ran into khexsexand our second French friend. While we were talking to him the ftist Frenchman rode up behind us again and warned us to avoid a small town that lay ahead of us.

FOOD FOR

We were guided around the village through a wood and again told to hide while one of the Frenchman want was gone to kring get us fant a package of food. We started off again following carefully the directions we had been given to go N of the village for some distance and then turn S. We got to the top of a hill and had turned S when we saw the two Frenchmen down in the valley waving us to go further N before making the turn. This was the last time we xwx saw our friends.

/ We stayed in the woods because BRANCH was still wearing flying boots PAIN FROM the blisters. were getting.

Soissons

TRAVET SONS main highers in the second sound that led us into the main highway to SOISSONS. Everytime we heard something approaching we ducked into a ditch or into the brush and once, hearing a motorcycle, we dived into a ditch where an old Frenchman was gathering wood. We explained that we were Americans and asked if the cyclist was a German. The old Frenchman motioned us to stay there and brought another Frenchman to talk to us. He hid us us in a cave in the wood, and when we asked for an English speaking person he brought a dictionary which we used to ask for clothes. While our friend was gone two children came to the cave to play and saw us. From what they/we knew they had recognised us as Americans, and we told our friend this when he returned. We were moved again and told to walk into a nearby churchyard that night and wait for a signal.

The Frenchman met us as arranged that night and showed us a place to hide, He had brought food with him. and We spent the night in this shelter and were there all the next day and following night, when the Frenchman brought two sets of civilian clothing. He told us we should leave the next morning.

CHOTHES

At day break we walked SE. Our last friend had warned us to avoid MEAUX and PARIS. Now that we were in civilian clothes we walked on secondary roads and at the next town we asked a boy for water. He pointed to the town pump So thore . and motioned us to go there. We didn't want to but the next person we asked not only told us to do the same thing but offered to walk to the pump with us. While we were getting a drink the Frenchman with us went into a store and in a few mintues a gendarme came out to ask us for identity cards. When he asked who we were I told him we were trying to walk to SPAIN and he misunderstood, thinking I meant we were Spanish. He made us put up our hands and while he searched us and when I said we were Americans he nodded but looked as if he didn't believe us. He found my aids box and motioned us to follow him in the store because we were ttracting some attetion and people were crowding / Mence around. He was quike interested in the aids box which I explained to him carefully and after he was convinced he walked away and left us. A Frenchmen who had followed us in the store took us to his home to point out of on maps the direction we should walk.

In the evening we stopped at to sleep in a barn on the edge of a small town. Before going in the barn we went to a man working alone near a house and asked for help. He said we couldn't get any help in this village and when we asked about going to the church we had seen in the village he said iwn it was closed. In spite of his lack of friendliness the man gave us some food and went back to his work.

SHALL

decided we had better go on looking for help. We went S keeping to the fields all morning. The next man we approached was reluctant to do anything for us but told us to wait and he would see if he could get anna someone to help. We hid after he had ridden off on a horse and when he didn't return after two hours we left. The we spoke to another working in the fields and sked if we could get a shave. He was agreeable about this but couldn't help give us any further help.

Our next stop was a small roadside cafe where we hoped to get something to drink. There was no one in the place when we walked in so we stated that we were ARTHER Americans in need of food and help. We waited while a man was sent for and after he had questioned us our journey was arranged.

- a. French stated that a flying school at ETAMPES was the largest in FRANCE.
- b. French stated that there was alarge ammunition and gasohine dump in a forest S of CHATEAUNEUF.
- stated that JU 88's had maximum picked up their bombs at this field before manifest London raids. In April the field was still operational after several raids.
- C. d. Evaders never saw enemy airdraft in the MEAUX area flying above deck.
- Only aircraft seen by evaders, other than Melogs and FW190s, was an Me410 in the vicinity of ETAVIGNY. (attooby one and School Me410)
- French stated that the Germans had an officer sa candidate school for 300 candidates at a chateau 3 miles N of CONGIS. (seine a SMARNE).
- At the end of May evaders saw large numbers of German naval personnel on streets of BORDEAUX. French stated that majority were submarine men.
- All anti-alreraft seen by evaders in PARIS around the middle of May was mobile.

Lt Jacobson:

- l. I used Horlicks tablets, halazone tablets, matches, chewing gum, water bottle, compass and sewing kit. The only unsatisfactory item was the water bottle.
- 2. I carried a YELLOW purse. I used the compass all the time, the file as a knife on several occasions, and gave the money to the French.

SUBJECT: Safeguarding of P/W Information.

TO : Personnel concerned.

- 1. It is the duty of all Americans to safeguard information which might, either directly or indirectly, be useful to the enemy.
- 2. It is an offense, carrying heavy penalties, to publish or to communicate to any unauthorized person any information which might be useful to the enemy.
- Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SECRET.
- a. You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations:

(1) The names of those who helped you.

(2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.

(3) The route you followed.

(4) Any other facts concerning your experience

- You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.

 You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
- d. You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4a.

 On lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of the War or Navy Department.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and
- Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or 2. communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (5 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War
